## **CARBON AND WATER MANAGEMENT IN HORTICULTURAL EXPORTS FROM EAST AFRICA**

**A multi-stakeholder workshop for exporters and local service providers in**

**Naivasha, 8-9 December 2011**

The aim of the workshop is to provide Kenyan fresh produce exporters, local service providers, representatives from the public sector, and professional associations, with an overview of the sustainability agenda in the agrifood sector, with a special emphasis on carbon and water management. The workshop will give an update on latest developments, and discuss some of the key issues facing Kenyan stakeholders. It will also be used to identify local capacity building needs, and thus enable the preparation of more targeted assistance in 2012.

The workshop is being organized jointly by PIP, ITC and FPEAK and will be held on the 8<sup>th</sup> and 9<sup>th</sup> of December 2011 in Naivasha, in collaboration with Kenya Bureau of Standards (KEBS) and the National Environment Agency (NEMA – to be confirmed).

It will be attended by exporters, local service providers, international subject experts, standard setters, policy makers, donors, professional associations, and representatives from the public sector.

This workshop is funded by the Government of Denmark and the European Development Fund.
